The Hon. Rebecca White MP

Assistant Minister for Health and Aged Care
Assistant Minister for Indigenous Health
Assistant Minister for Women

Rebecca grew up on a farm and maintains a love of the land and animals. She lives with her young family on a small acreage at Richmond in Tasmania. Rebecca is passionate about ensuring there is equality of opportunity for all Australians regardless of where they live, their background or circumstances.

First elected to the Tasmanian Parliament in 2010 for the seat of Lyons, Rebecca served as Parliamentary Secretary to the Premier in the Labor government and was later appointed Minister for Human Services. She was the Leader of the Tasmanian Labor Party from 2017 to 2024.

Rebecca was elected to Federal Parliament in 2025 and appointed Assistant Minister for Health and Aged Care, Indigenous Health and Women.

Rebecca graduated from the University of Tasmania in 2004 with a combined Commerce and Arts degree with majors in international business management and marketing, journalism and political science. She is also a Graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

The Hon. Andrew Hoggard is the Minister for Biosecurity and Food Safety and the Associate Minister of Agriculture (Animal Welfare, Skills) and for the Environment.

Qualified in Applied Economics, Andrew is a lifelong dairy farmer who worked his way to the role of President of Federated Farmers of New Zealand. He held this role until 2023 and later the same year was elected to Parliament as an ACT Party MP.

Sophie Dwyer PSM

Adjunct Professor at University of Queensland
Public/Environmental Health Leader

Sophie Dwyer has had a diverse career in public, environment and occupational health. She spent most of her career working in Queensland Health including responsibility for a range of public health environment and regulatory programs. These programs addressed the health impacts of environmental risks and included food safety, drugs and poisons regulation, radiation safety, water quality, chemicals and pollution events and climate change. She was awarded a Public Service Medal for her work in environmental and public health, and an Honorary Fellowship of Environmental Health Australia.

Though recently retired, Sophie maintains an active connection with public and environmental health through her role as convenor of the PHAA Ecology and Environment SIG and chair of the NHMRC Dietary Guidelines Sustainability Working Group. She holds an adjunct professor role at the University of Queensland.



Professor Peter Prentis

Director- Centre for Agriculture and the Bioeconomy at
Queensland University of Technology

Professor Peter Prentis is a leading academic at the Queensland University of Technology (QUT), serving as a Professor and Centre Director in Agriculture and the Bioeconomy. His work focuses on advancing innovative, sustainable solutions across agriculture and food systems, with particular expertise in plant science, crop improvement and bio-based production systems. Through an interdisciplinary approach, Professor Prentis integrates genomics, biotechnology and data-driven research to enhance agricultural productivity, resilience and sustainability. He plays a key leadership role in driving collaborative research partnerships with industry, government and international organisations, aiming to address major global challenges such as food security, climate adaptation and the transition to a circular bioeconomy.

Dr Kent leads a rapidly growing research program focused on infant and child feeding practices and the structural determinants shaping nutrition behaviours, underpinned by strong consumer engagement.

Program Lead, Food Governance at The George Institute for Global Health (UNSW)

Alexandra Jones is a public health lawyer and researcher specialising in regulatory approaches to healthier and more sustainable diets. Her work supports governments in Australia and internationally to design and implement effective food regulation, with a focus on food labelling, composition, pricing and marketing. She works closely with policymakers, international agencies and public health organisations to translate evidence into action and has contributed to significant reforms in nutrition labelling systems in Australia and globally.

Best known for their iconic yellow food rescue vans which save over 400 tonnes of food every week from over 2,600 food donors and deliver it direct to more than 1,500 charities that feed people in need, OzHarvest also runs three national education programs, and aims to halve Australia's food waste by 2030.
